Charles Darwin: The Ape Man

Charles Darwin, born in 1809, upset the foundations of life science with his theory that man descended from the apes. His Theory of Evolution developed from his five-year trip as a naturalist. Observing the magnificent biodiversity of flora and fauna around the world, he deduced that natural selection accounted for the transmission of beneficial traits to descendants of species as they competed for success adapted to local climatic and geographical conditions.

Isaac Newton: The Smartest Kid in Town

Isaac Newton, born in England 1643, is recognized as one of the most influential scientific minds of all time. He improved on refractive telescopes when he built the first reflective telescope, using mirrors instead of lenses. He formulated the three universal laws of motions: the law of inertia, the law of force and the law of action and reaction, laying the foundation for classical mechanics.

Nikola Tesla: The Forgotten Genius

Born in Croatia in 1856, Tesla was a forgotten contributor to some of the most important technological advances in modern times. Tesla researched wireless power distribution, X-rays for medical use, radar, and vertical lift airplanes. He invented florescent lighting and developed the fore-runner of the radio, later patented by Marconi.

Johannes Kepler: The Music of the Spheres

Young German mathematician, Johannes Kepler, decided to prove the heliocentric theory of Copernicus. After publishing his first book, "*The Cosmic Mystery*" he was offered a position as an assistant at the astronomy laboratory of Tycho Brahe. It was Tycho's analytical data of the position and movements of the planets that led Kepler to formulate his mathematical description of the heavens.

Galileo Galilei: And Yet It Moves

Galileo Galilei is considered the father of modern science. He designed and built the first space telescope, and with it he mapped the craters of the moon, discovered the rings of Saturn and the 4 largest moons of Jupiter. When he published his ideas and findings in 1632, the church tried him for heresy and he was sentenced to house arrest for the remainder of his days. He was saved from execution by recanting his view, but he was said to have muttered, at the end of his trial “and yet it moves”!

Albert Einstein: Everything is Relative

Albert Einstein revolutionized the way we see the universe. His study of the photoelectric effect opened the door to the new field of quantum mechanics, and he won the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1921. He found that space and time connected in a very physical way, and his special theory of relativity was proven over time.

Benjamin Franklin: Science & Politics

In 1706 Benjamin Franklin was born in Boston, and although he was a voracious reader, he had to quit school at age 10 to apprentice in his brother’s print shop. His quest for efficiency led to inventions such as bi-focal lenses, swim fins, the odometer and the lightning rod. His experiments led him to conclude that lightning was electric in nature, and that light is a wave.

Louis Pasteur: Get Vaccinated!

Pioneering German scientist Robert Koch and Louis Pasteur became the fathers of bacteriology. When smallpox was decimating populations, Dr. Edward Jenner discovered that English milkmaids who contracted cowpox were then immune to smallpox. He confirmed his theories by experimenting on his patients, and amazingly none of them died! Pasteur then immunized chickens using weakened cholera bacterial cultures, and he also experimented with rabies vaccines. Pasteur’s greatest accomplishment was convincing medical practitioners to sterilize their hands and their instruments before moving from one patient to another, saving many human lives.

Pythagoras: Numbers, Numbers!

Pythagoras believed that the secrets of the universe could be understood in numeric form: planets, musical scales, forms of art and justice could all be represented by numbers. The Pythagorean Theorem was mathematical proof of an idea that was already basic to Egyptian construction. The Pythagorean Theorem is still a cornerstone of mathematics today, and the formula can be used to build a pyramid, calculate a position using GPS, or solve a crime.

Euclid: The Elements!

Euclid became known as the father of geometry, and his book, “Euclid’s Elements,” has influenced philosophy and science for thousands of years. His methods were used by Galileo to study falling objects, Kepler for his laws of motion, and Newton in his study of gravity. Einstein’s theory of relativity is a modern example of non-Euclidian science, but Euclidian geometry is still in use today. Each generation of science learns from the previous generation and teaches the next.

Marie Curie: The Radium Woman!

Marie Sklodowska was born in Warsaw, Poland, and she later became the first woman to win a Nobel Prize. Because women could not attend the University of Warsaw, she attended classes in a secret Warsaw “floating university”. Henri Becquerel’s discovery that some minerals emitted spontaneous radiation led Marie to experiment with radioactive pitchblende. The Curies discovered a new element, radioactive polonium, and Marie also isolated radium. They won the Nobel Prize for their research in radioactivity, and Marie later won a second Nobel Prize for the discovery of polonium and radium. Marie’s years of exposure to radiation led to her death of cancer in 1934.

Thomas Robert Malthus: Numbers & People!

Known as the father of demography, Malthus described how to predict population growth and plan for the future of humanity. He believed that population was growing too fast in proportion to the resources available for sustainability, and he predicted that massive inequality and poverty would result. His ideas about demography and sustainability are very relevant today as activists demand responsible use of natural resources and restrictions on the uncontrolled growth burdening the planet.

Alessandro Volta: Batteries Not Included!

In 1799, after 10 years of study, Volta revealed the battery, his invention that consisted of silver plates interspersed with copper plates separated by cardboard and immersed in salt water. It generated a continuously flowing electric current, and became the foundation for electrical science research for centuries. Today’s batteries use more efficient and durable materials, but they generate a serious contamination problem for the environment. In 1827, Volta’s own batteries ran out! In his honour, the unit for measuring electrical potential was called a volt.

The Peel is last intact watershed left in North America, and an ongoing legal battle has been fighting to keep the region protected despite mounting pressure to open it to mining claims.

Through the lens of these six artists: a Metis writer, a photographer, a visual artist, a painter, a glass artist/sculptor, and a composer/sound artist -- The Peel Project follows their attempts to create artwork in the true wilderness of Canada's high north.

Battling the elements and the frustration of creating in such conditions, we see the beauty of place and people through the eyes of these six southerners. The artist's journey opens discussions on nationality, resource extraction and respect for the traditional territory of the First Nations. Set in an awe-inspiring landscape the world is in peril of losing, *The Peel Project* is a story of art, adventure and Canadian identity. Not only does the film, and the art inspired by the journey, capture the beauty of the landscape, wildlife and culture of one of Canada's last intact watersheds, it serves as a canvas to understand a larger struggle. This watershed is

one of the last undeveloped watersheds left in Canada. As of 2014, 71% was opened for economic development related to mining and oil exploration. A war is being waged between those who want to develop this immense water system and those who want to protect its delicate ecological balance – especially the First Nations who view it as their land's lifeblood and a support for its teeming wildlife.

Biosphere reserves are regions of global ecological significance that make an ongoing commitment to the United Nations to strive for sustainability. They are places where people are inspired to find ways to live and work in harmony with nature. This series explains what is happening in Canada's biosphere reserves – the successes and the challenges of people determined to create a sustainable

future for their communities. Come with us on a coast to coast journey spanning thousands of years to find out what makes them special, from geological, ecological, historical and cultural perspectives. Bras d'Or Biosphere Reserve, Nova Scotia

Bras d'Or Lake is located in Nova Scotia and consists of a salt-water estuary watershed 'inland sea'. The terrestrial, marine and coastal habitats provide a home for human populations, as well as other organisms. The original settlers colonized the region following the retreat of glaciers, and today their descendants make up the Mi'kmaq populations. The area sustained the Mi'kmaq people for millennia. With European settlement, the region's economy shifted to an industrial model that ultimately proved to be unsustainable. There has been a long struggle here to find sustainable industry with the oyster. For over 40 years, aquaculture has played a key role in the area's economy. However, in 2002, the parasite M.S.X. killed over 90% of the oysters in Cape Breton's Bras d'Or Lake. Using science and traditional Mi'kmaq knowledge, people are finding innovative ways to recover this most sustainable local industry.

Clayoquot Sound Biosphere Reserve, British Columbia

Encompassing 350 000 hectares on the west coast of Vancouver Island, Clayoquot Sound contains some of the largest tracts of intact, coastal temperate rainforest in North America. The area has garnered much attention in the past when Aboriginal people and environmentalists conflicted with the logging industry. However, moving forward, the work to build a sustainable Clayoquot Sound is ongoing. People here are mitigating the effects of industrial logging, reducing the impacts of tourism, growing sustainable seafood, uncovering historical ecosystems using ancient whale bones, and volunteering to clean up garbage from half a world away. But most importantly, they are using traditional knowledge to create practical economical models to support people and the environment. One of the ways this is happening is through an increased recognition of the traditional practices of the regions First Nations, the Nuu-chah-nulth people.

Georgian Bay Biosphere Reserve, Ontario

Georgian Bay is home to the world's largest freshwater archipelago - a 200 km long exposed part of the Canadian Shield known as the "30,000 islands." Some of the highest diversity of reptile and amphibian species in Canada can be found in the 10,000 wetlands stippling the Bay - a refuge for many rare and threatened species, like the Massasauga Rattlesnake. Increasingly people are also finding refuge on the Bay. At just a few hours north of Canada's largest city, Toronto, the pressure is on local communities to find ways for more people to be part of this special region, without sacrificing what makes it unique in the first place. The area is home to the Magnetawan First Nation people. In First Nations traditions, Massasaugas are the medicine keepers of the land, a reminder to tread lightly and to take only what we need. The Magnetawan community plays a big role in saving this often misunderstood species.

Despite its unique natural environment, the small rural population numbers have declined and the constant struggle to be economically viable lives right alongside a staunch determination to protect the environment the people call home. The areas first people, the Plains Cree by developing a sustainable symbiotic relationship with the bison and the Prairie landscape.

Waterton Biosphere Reserve, Alberta

The story of how the Waterton Biosphere Reserve has remained largely ecologically intact is a remarkable tale beginning with the region's Indigenous people, the Kootenay and Blackfoot. It is an area these people went for ceremonial purposes and to hunt the herds of bison that were an important part of the prairie's ecosystem. Things changed quickly in the 1800s when ranchers moved in, disease spread, treaties were signed and bison numbers decreased dramatically due to European hunters. Agriculture and ranchers took over. As time has progressed, the ranchers have been challenged to find ways to coexist with the powerful grizzly bear. The protected mountains of the Waterton Lakes National Park create the perfect habitat for grizzlies. The richness of this land is the result of centuries of care and management. But more than once has its ecological integrity hung in the balance, preserved at the last minute by people who seem inspired by this place to think bigger than themselves.

Mont Saint-Hilaire Biosphere Reserve, Quebec

Most of these problems are not unique to the Fundy Biosphere Reserve, but people here are leading the way in how to deal with them.

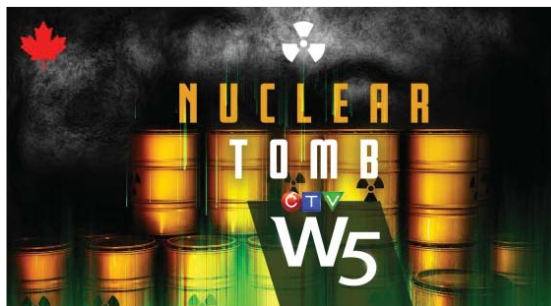

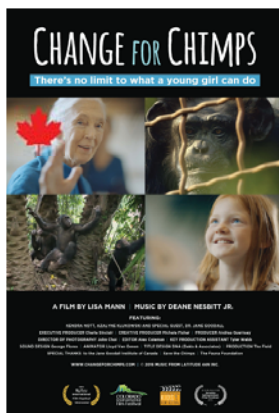

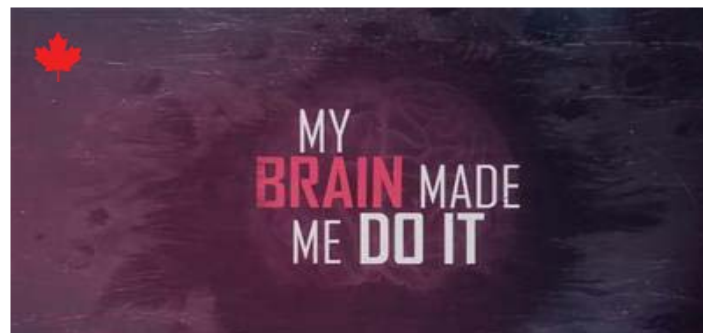

More Than Just the Fur Trade

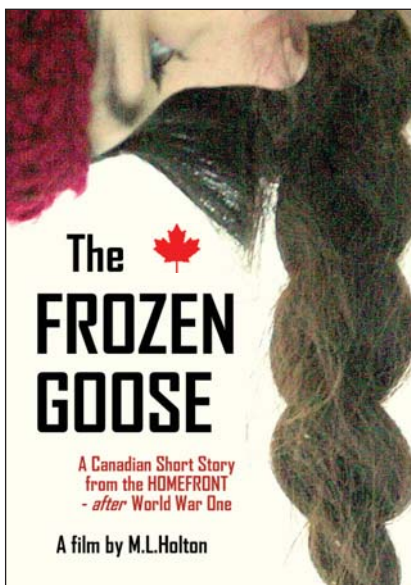

The confluence of the Ottawa and Mattawa Rivers was an important strategic area for those who travelled this historic waterway. It was the main route to the western part of Canada for thousands of years. This passage was instrumental in the development of early Canada and the fur trade. It is where explorers like Samuel de Champlain and Étienne Brûlé rested before pushing onwards to Lake Nipissing and the interior of Canada. It was also the site of the Mattawa House, a 7-building Hudson Bay Post. In this area known as the “Meeting of the Waters,” First Nations people and French fur traders carved out a life. With the arrival of the explorers came the trappers. Beaver pelts were highly sought after and were easily tradable for goods needed to live in this area.

In *More Than Just the Fur Trade*, students learn not only about the history of the fur trade in Canada, but also about the importance of language, culture, drumming, elders and regalia in the lives of indigenous peoples in Canada. Interviews with Mike Gauthier, member of Mattawa North Bay Algonquin's; historian Mike Whelan; and Trapper and Canoe Builder Roger Labelle provide interesting insight into indigenous lives drawing the connections between contemporary and traditional aboriginal culture.

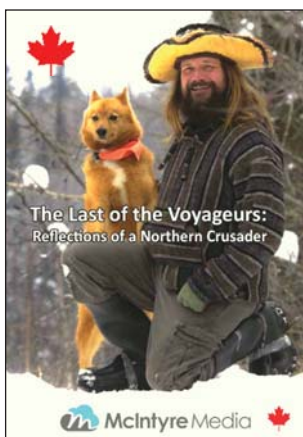

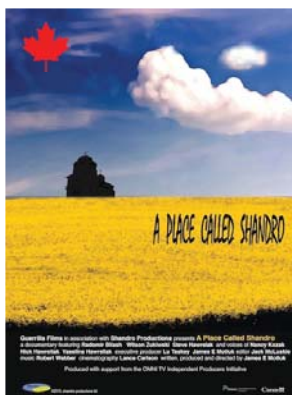

During the Second World War, Canada declared war with Japan on December 8, 1941, after the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. There were many Japanese-Canadians living on the British Columbia coast, most of whom were fishers and many of whom were second-generation Canadians. Many British Columbia residents were afraid that the Japanese-Canadians were spies, and coupled with long-time racism and resentment, they lobbied the federal government to deport or intern Japanese-Canadians for the duration of the war. Prime Minister Mackenzie King issued the order, and Japanese-Canadians had their assets and properties seized and auctioned to pay for the internment. Families were often separated and they were sent to camps in the BC interior. At the end of the war, internees were given the choice of moving east to Ontario or Manitoba, or deportation to Japan. This documentary tells why Japanese Canadians were forcibly removed from the West Coast in 1942 and placed on sugar beet farms as labourers in Manitoba and finally settling in Winnipeg.

In 1945, as the Second World War neared its end, the Allied powers, led by Churchill, Roosevelt and Stalin, signed the Yalta Accord, an agreement that, among other things, allowed the USSR to forcibly repatriate any person the

Soviets deemed to be a former national. This included over a million Ukrainian refugees stranded in DP (Displaced Person) camps in Germany, many of whom feared that returning to the USSR would mean a one way trip to Siberia. But a group of Canadian soldiers, led by Flight Lieutenant Bohdan Panchuk, lobbied the Allied powers to override Yalta and allow these refugees to resettle in the west. Their efforts were Herculean. Panchuk himself flew to Ottawa in 1945 to make an impassioned plea before the Canadian Senate. Even Eleanor Roosevelt got involved. In the end, hundreds of thousands of refugees were able to escape the grip of the USSR.

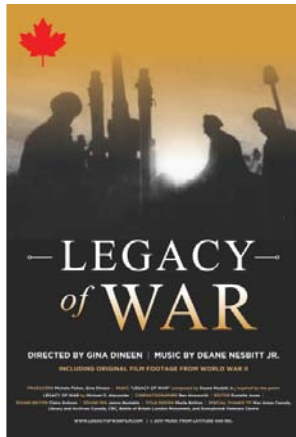

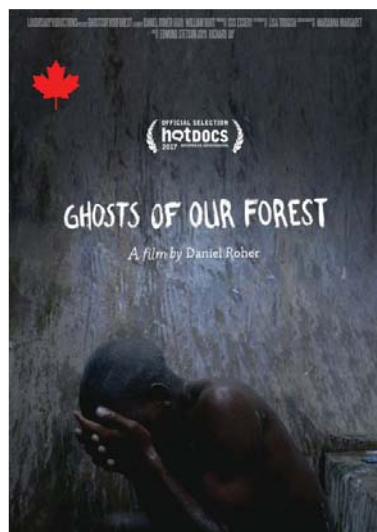

Upon eviction, however, the Batwa received nothing in the way of compensation or support, and so fell into poverty.

Nearly 25 years later, a young Batwa named Gad Semejeri is doing everything he can to preserve his culture in the face of social oppression and substance abuse. Along with a group of young Batwa, he founded the Batwa Music Club, a band that strives to reclaim its cultural heritage by performing traditional songs that speak out against the injustices the tribe has suffered.

They end up making paper accordion fans so people can fan themselves with a cool breeze or wind (thôtin). Aboriginal people make beautiful fans from feathers which are used in dances and ceremonies.

Scary Garden

Katie's mom needs kistikâcikana (seeds) for her garden. Louis thinks maybe they are missing a scarecrow for her garden. Katie and Louis gather fabric, wood and hay to build a scarecrow. Despite the mistake, the scarecrow is an important feature of the garden. In the past, some aboriginal people had community members whose job was to scare crows away from the corn fields.

More Than Just the Fur Trade

The confluence of the Ottawa and Mattawa Rivers was an important strategic area for those who travelled this historic waterway. It was the main route to the western part of Canada for thousands of years. This passage was instrumental in the development of early Canada and the fur trade. It is where explorers like Samuel de Champlain and Étienne Brûlé rested before pushing onwards to Lake Nipissing and the interior of Canada. It was also the site of the Mattawa House, a 7-building Hudson Bay Post. In this area known as the "Meeting of the Waters," First Nations people and French fur traders carved out a life. With the arrival of the explorers came the trappers. Beaver pelts were highly sought after and were easily tradable for goods needed to live in this area.

In *More Than the Fur Trade*, students learn not only about the history of the fur trade in Canada, but also about the importance of language, culture, drumming, elders and regalia in the lives of indigenous peoples in Canada. Interviews with Mike Gauthier, member of Mattawa North Bay Algonquin's; historian Mike Whelan; and Trapper and Canoe Builder Roger Labelle provide interesting insight into indigenous lives drawing the connections between contemporary and traditional aboriginal culture.

resources. The impact of broken promises and cultural genocide on a population decimated by small pox and disease are felt to this day. The past does not lie passively in history textbooks but lives in flesh and blood today.

As Blackfoot Elder Narcisse Blood once spoke "the folly is when we think man is it." We must respect all life. History deepens our sense of place and reveals the mistakes of civilization. While acknowledging the human rights abuses of the past, the filmmakers also discover a sense of joy and hope for the future. As it turns out, an elder in the making is a responsibility we all share.

For the size of their population, Aboriginal women in Canada account for an incredibly overrepresented percentage of missing persons and murder statistics. Sheena, a lost teenager, is placed in a girl's home. Seemingly forgotten and yearning for a life of freedom, she runs away, only to be picked up by a dangerous stranger. The directorial debut by actor Kawennáhere Devery Jacobs is a sober commentary of missing Indigenous women. The short

film debuted at imagineNATIVE Film and Media Arts Festival and was inspired in part by the life and tragic death of Tina Fontaine. Not unlike Sheena, Fontaine, 15, was in the care of Manitoba Child and Family Services when she was reported missing to the Winnipeg Police Service. She'd been staying in a downtown hotel, reportedly placed there by social workers before her disappearance. Days later, her body was pulled from the Red River in August of 2014. Fontaine's death renewed calls to undertake an independent national inquiry into missing and murdered aboriginal women. "The haunting song "Stolen" at end of the video is performed by young Canadian electro-pop artist Johnny Saga and his band "Wolf Saga" from London, Ontario.

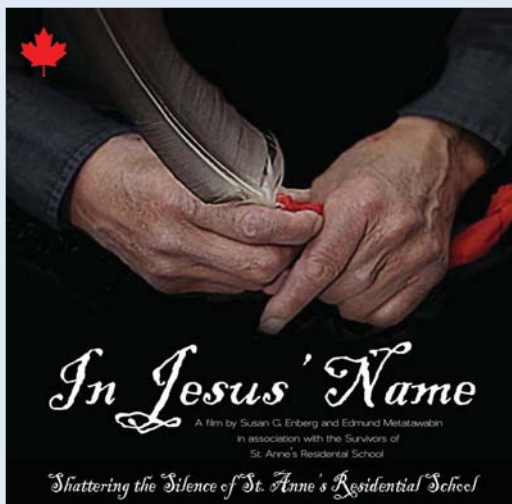

'In Jesus' Name: Shattering the Silence of St. Anne's Residential School' is a poignant all-Indigenous English and Cree-English collaborative documentary film that breaks long-held silences imposed upon children who were interned at the notoriously violent St. Anne's Residential School in Fort Albany First Nation, Ontario. First Nations children from all over the western James Bay region suffered isolation from family and community as well as physical, sexual, spiritual and cultural abuse at the hands of the Catholic Oblates of Mary Immaculate and the Sisters of Charity. Some were abused by other students who had learned violent behaviours from their 'caregivers.' While Chief Wilton Littlechild imparts some of what he learned from his six years as a Truth and Reconciliation Commissioner, seven St. Anne's survivors publicly share their acutely emotional stories, some for the very first time. The film also brings to light how, in this era of

truth and reconciliation, the Canadian government continues to try to silence knowledge of abuses that occurred at St. Anne's by withholding evidence from the survivors as they seek compensation for harms done to them when they were just children.

A parents' quest to 'recover' their two-year-old son from Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) takes them on a bittersweet journey, testing them in ways they never expected.

With the arrival of twins Oskar and Izzy, this family of seven had their hands full. But parents Carly and Stef were about to notice things with Oskar that seemed all too familiar. Nine years earlier, Carly's oldest son was diagnosed with autism. His speech was delayed, he engaged in repetitive behaviours (stims), and he seemed to be in a constant state of anxiety. When they started to see similar red flags in Oskar, they did their best write it off: "He's a boy;" "He's sad;" "He's distracted." But videotaping and analyzing Oskar along side his twin sister, it soon became impossible to ignore: Oskar wasn't typical.

At two years old, Oskar is diagnosed with severe autism. Carly and Stef make a profound commitment to quit work and spend a year helping Oskar achieve his developmental milestones. They are inspired by the success they had with Carly's older

autistic son, who has not only overcome many of his early challenges but is now ahead of his peers in many ways. Carly and Stef credit drastic diet changes and other therapies for this transformation. And they start down a similar path with Oskar.

But Oskar proves to be very different from his older brother, and progress seems fleeting to non-existent. With every setback, the film delves deeper into the mystery that is Oskar. Several adults with autism, including Temple Grandin, share their personal experiences and help us gain insight into Oskar's world.

Life with an autistic child involves a lot of small (and not so small) daily challenges that impact the whole family. This honest yet hopeful portrait follows Carly and her family to the breaking point, where they must rethink everything. As they strive to connect with Oskar, they must confront an impossible question: should they try to change Oskar, or accept him just the way he is?

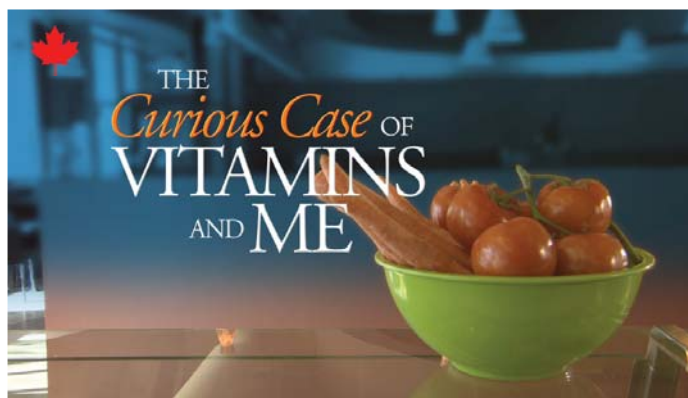

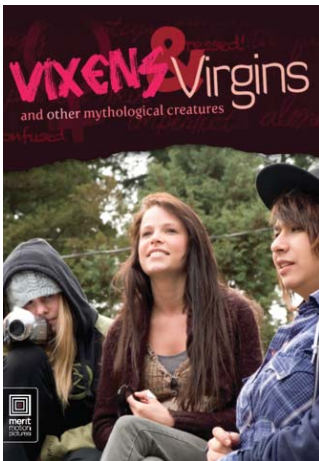

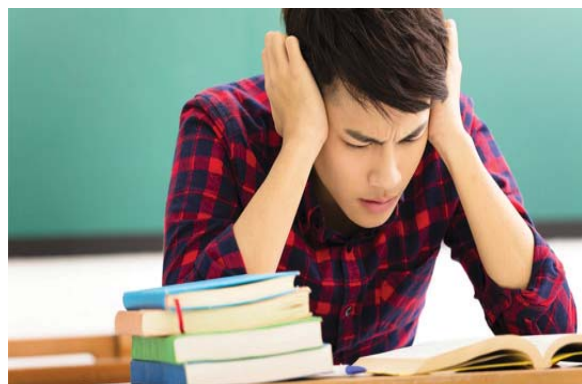

With the arrival of twins Oskar and Izzy, this family of seven had their hands full. But parents Carly and

Stef were about to notice things with Oskar that seemed all too familiar. Nine years earlier, Carly's oldest son was diagnosed with autism. His speech was delayed, he engaged in repetitive behaviours (stims), and he seemed to be in a constant state of anxiety. When they started to see similar red flags in Oskar, they did their best write it off: "He's a boy," "He's sad," "He's distracted." But videotaping and analyzing Oskar along side his twin sister, it soon became impossible to ignore: Oskar wasn't typical.

At two years old, Oskar is diagnosed with severe autism. Carly and Stef make a profound commitment to quit work and spend a year helping Oskar achieve his developmental milestones. They are inspired by the success they had with Carly's older autistic son, who has not only overcome many of his early challenges but is now ahead of his peers in many ways. Carly and Stef credit drastic diet changes and other therapies for this transformation. And they start down a similar path with Oskar.

But Oskar proves to be very different from his older brother, and progress seems fleeting to non-existent. With every setback, the film delves deeper into the mystery that is Oskar. Several adults with autism, including Temple Grandin, share their personal experiences and help us gain insight into Oskar's world.

Life with an autistic child involves a lot of small (and not so small) daily challenges that impact the whole family. This honest yet hopeful portrait follows Carly and her family to the breaking point, where they must rethink everything. As they strive to connect with Oskar, they must confront an impossible question: should they try to change Oskar, or accept him just the way he is?
