## Six Canadians Take an Extraordinary Journey Through Indigenous Canada

By and large, Canadians' opinions about the Indigenous people of this country are formed without any knowledge of the culture's true history or firsthand experience of the present-day communities. This may explain the prevalence of racist, unsympathetic and generally prejudicial attitudes that are often directed towards this community. *First Contact* takes six Canadians on a 28- day journey intended to challenge these attitudes and shed a light on the true Indigenous experience. The travelers, all with strong opinions about Indigenous people, have been invited to leave their everyday lives behind and embark on a unique journey, travelling deep into the Indigenous communities throughout Canada. It is a journey that will challenge their perceptions and confront their prejudices about a world they never imagined they would see.

## **Episode 1: The Journey Begins**

Beginning their journey in Winnipeg, the six travelers meet with prominent Indigenous activist Michael Redhead Champagne who sheds some light on the journey ahead. The participants work with two community driven movements who deal with safety and murdered and missing Indigenous women before heading north to the remote Inuit community of Kimmirut where they encounter a shared economy movment that ensures everyone can eat due to the incredibly high cost of store-bought food.

## **Episode 2: A Group Divided**

The six travelers arrive in Muskrat Dam in Northern Ontario, where they live on a remote reserve and learn why relocation is not an option for families who have been there for generations. They will hear about the impact of residential schools and the current issue of clean drinking water that impacts 140 reserves across the country. The next stop on their journey is Maskwacis, a town deep in the heart of Alberta with a reputation for gnags, crime and a high suicide rate. While initially some sights seem to back up their fears about this community, by the time this leg of their journey is over, the six will have attended their first Pow Wow and sweat lodge ceremony, experiencing Indigenous culture in ways most non-Indigenous people never have the chance to.

## **Episode 3: A Road to Healing**

So far on the journey the travelers have had their views confronted and their emotions pushed to the limit, but the travelers are about to face their biggest test yet. Heading south to Calgary, the group experiences life on the streets, getting a glimpse into the humanity of both those working to help and those struggling with their circumstances. After, they go north to an Edmonton prison to learn about life on the inside. The final stop is in Ahousaht First Nation on Vancouver Island. Historically, Ahousaht has suffered many issues, but in recent years, with strong leadership from within, the reserve has made many changes and turned the community around. Raven's Quest features first-person stories told by Indigenous children from across the country. The series visits different political and physical regions in Canada, including: the lush landscape of British Columbia to visit a girl from the Haida Nation who demonstrates how to make a cedar bark basket; the city of Ottawa, where an Inuit girl explains the importance of throat singing; and Nova Scotia where a boy who is Mi'kmaq shares his passion for traditional dancing.

The series introduces children to the diversity of Indigenous communities, showing the different languages, territories, and traditions of each nation. Most importantly, we see that even though the lives of Indigenous children are similar to other Canadian children, their lives on and off reserves are enriched by their cultural traditions and knowledge. Today, when children learn about residential schools and some of the hardships on reserves, they may be left with negative stereotypes of the viability of Indigenous communities. For this reason, this series is very important to counter this looming typecast by presenting the lives of Indigneous communities and children in a positive light with an age-appropriate format.

He explains that smudging is an important tradition.


## Cayda

Josée Bourgeois is an Algonquin life-giving woman who is a part of a very important generation dedicated to the preservation and sustainability of her people. She is a Fancy Shawl dancer and a Jingle Dress dancer, who is very passionate about representing her people and her culture.

Josée discusses her father's existence as part of the 60's Scoop when 20,000 Canadian Indigenous children were placed in foster homes or put up for adoption. This, and an early introduction to powwow ceremonies helped shape Josee's mission to connect with her culture. And this ultimately became a reason why she dances.

Her message is a statement of a growing strength of a people who once were banned from ceremonies and dancing. In this program, Josee gives us insight into the jingle and fancy shawl dances, as well as explaining the significance of regalia, too often confused with "costumes." She provides insight into many historical truths such as the Buffalo Bill travelling shows that portrayed "Indians" as savages and cowboys as the 'good guys.' Dancing provides healing and she encourages us to think about how we as individuals can play a part in the action of reconciliation. She asks that people attend powwows and begin to understand and open their hearts to her culture.

Prior to the arrival of Europeans, First Nations people were a richly diversified, self-sufficient culture living in various areas of Canada. Much of that changed with the arrival of the first Europeans. When European explorers and settlers arrived here, their success and survival rested on the guidance and assistance of the First Nations who at the time vastly outnumbered the visitors.

In 1763, King George III recognized Aboriginal rights and title to land through the Royal Proclamation. However, the new settlers also were given permission to colonize and purchase First Nations land. The resulting impact was residential schools, reserves, forbidden ceremonies, and disease all leading to a culture that lost its identity. Colonization is the disconnection of Indigenous people from the land, their history, their identity and their rights so that others benefit. It is a basic form of injustice, and has been condemed as a practice by the United Nations.

In this program from award-winning Métis filmmaker Matt LeMay, we explore the history and consequences of the Canadian Government's attempts to assimilate Canada's Indigenous population. We explore the Indian Act, the establishment of the Canadian Residential School system, broken treaty promises, and the 60's scoop. He had the perfect cover for a pedophile. Rowe abused an estimated 500 native boys throughout the 1970s and 80s.

"Survivors Rowe" documents the harrowing and tragic stories of three men who as boys were victims of Rowe. Joshua Frog, John Fox and Ralph Winter open their hearts to recount the abuse they experienced as children, and how their lives disintegrated because of it. For the size of their population, Indigenous women in Canada account for an incredibly overrepresented percentage of missing persons and murder statistics. Sheena, a lost teenager, is placed in a girl's home. Seemingly forgotten and yearning for a life of freedom, she runs away, only to be picked up by a dangerous stranger. The directorial debut by actor Kawennáhere Devery Jacobs is a sober commentary of missing Indigenous women. The short film debuted at

imagineNATIVE Film and Media Arts Festival and was inspired in part by the life and tragic death of Tina Fontaine. Not unlike Sheena, Fontaine, 15, was in the care of Manitoba Child and Family Services when she was reported missing to the Winnipeg Police Service. She'd been staying in a downtown hotel, reportedly placed there by social workers before her disappearance. Days later, her body was pulled from the Red River in August of 2014. Fontaine's death renewed calls to undertake an independent national inquiry into missing and murdered aboriginal women. "The haunting song "Stolen" at the end of the video is performed by young Canadian electropop artist Johnny Saga and his band "Wolf Saga" from London, Ontario.

the world. Violence against women is also a serious issue in Canada, unfortunately.


One particular group of Canadian women merit special attention: Indigenous women and girls in Canada experience a scale and severity of violence that constitutes a national human rights crisis.

The issue of violence against aboriginal women and girls is a systemic one with deep roots in sexism, poverty and racism. To properly address the situation, one must understand the history and impact of colonization on Aboriginal peoples in Canada. There has been a cycle of trauma and abuse brought on by residential schools, and by the 60s Scoop — where large numbers of aboriginal children were forcibly taken into the child welfare system.



The confluence of the Ottawa and Mattawa Rivers was an important strategic area for those who travelled this historic waterway. It was the main route to the western part of Canada for thousands of years. This passage was instrumental in the development of early Canada and the fur trade. It is where explorers like Samuel de Champlain and Étienne Brûlé rested before pushing onwards to Lake Nipissing and the interior of Canada. It was also the site of the Mattawa House, a 7-building Hudson Bay Post. In this area known as the "Meeting of the Waters," Indigenous people and French fur

traders carved out a life. With the arrival of the explorers came the trappers. Beaver pelts were highly sought after and were easily tradable for goods needed to live in this area.

In More Than the Fur Trade, students learn not only about the history of the fur trade in Canada, but also about the importance of language, culture, drumming, elders and regalia in the lives of Indigenous peoples in Canada. Interviews with Mike Gauthier, member of Mattawa North Bay Algonquin's; historian Mike Whelan; and Trapper and Canoe Builder Roger Labelle provide interesting insight into Indigenous lives drawing the connections between contemporary and traditional Indigenous culture.



Battling the elements and the frustration of creating in such conditions, we see the beauty of place and people through the eyes of these six southerners. The artist's journey opens discussions on nationality, resource extraction and respect for the traditional territory of the First Nations. Set in an awe-inspiring landscape the world is in peril of losing, *The Peel Project* is a story of art, adventure and Canadian identity. Not only does the film, and the art inspired by the journey, capture the beauty of

the landscape, wildlife and culture of one of Canada's last intact watersheds, it serves as a canvas to understand a larger struggle. This watershed is one of the last undeveloped watersheds left in Canada. As of 2014, 71% was opened for economic development related to mining and oil exploration. A war is being waged between those who want to develop this immense water system and those who want to protect its delicate ecological balance – especially the First Nations who view it as their land's lifeblood and a support for its teeming wildlife.






